
PICT'S FROM THE PAST




Neill Vroom picked up this very nice English fussee skeleton clock and Charlie MaGee just finished this unique 400 day clock.





I had to make a barrel for a German Westminster Chime clock that I bought quite some time ago. At one time, someone tried to very crudely replace 3 broken teeth with some filed down bolts inserted in place of the teeth. (Top left picture). The barrel also had a few bent teeth as well, so a new barrel was begun. Top right is the barrel in the lathe, and then the finished barrel getting a proper bushing installed.





Lastly, I had a triple fussee that broke a chain. Looked in the bottom of the clock and saw a few loose links so I thought I would just order a new chain. (\$83.50US) When the new chain arrived, bottom one in the above picture, I was really disappointed. It was so crudely made that I couldn't bring myself to use it. Ended up splitting a link, making a new pin and then riveting it all back together. So far everything's holding together. Knock on wood.
